## Course Description and Goals

**Course Description:** This course is intended to inform students in their transitional stage to understand their identities, interest, passion, and the world around them. During the course of ten weeks, students will seek answers to the following questions: What is the meaning of learning? How did the structure of education evolve? What are the sociocultural contexts that constructed norms in the world and society? In what way can we make innovative changes? Through the utilization of active learning strategies, the course offers an opportunity to critically analyze and address sociocultural, sociopolitical, socioeconomic, and sociolinguistic issues.

**Course Goals:** By participating in this course, students will:

- Engage in and lead collaborative activities and analyses of multimedia and digital discourse.
- Participate in and develop active learning strategies to advance academic skills.
- Explain the relationship society, culture, and context have to discourse and digital literacy.

## Course Requirements

- **Seminar Engagement:** Your engagement grade will reflect your attendance, participation, and contributions to discussions. Students are expected to actively participate, contribute their own ideas and ask questions during their seminar-style class. Students are expected to attend all class sessions. Communicate with your instructor regarding the weekly assignments if or when you miss a class session.
- **Weekly Activity:** Each lesson topic will require an activity/task to be completed by the end of the class. These are generally completed during class meetings. The information will be updated after each class meeting on Friday. If you missed a class session, please check Brightspace to complete make-up assignments.
- **Critical Inquiry Project Milestones:** In preparation for the final critical inquiry project, you are expected to complete three milestones. Milestone 1, faculty interview, is due Feb 17. Milestone 2, project proposal, is due March 3. Milestone 3, research-based evidence, is due March 24.
- **Critical Inquiry Project:** This final assignment, the critical inquiry project, will be presented in a creative format. In small groups, you will conduct an inquiry and complete an individual reflection.

## Evaluation and Grading

The SBU 102 class is a 1-credit course for which you will earn a letter grade. Attendance, participation, and the quality and creativity of assignments will be factored into the overall grading for this course.

- Critical Inquiry Project=25%
